Chomsky on learning and assessment ...

Noam Chomsky: Bubble Tests "Destroy Any Meaningful Educational Process" By Diane Ravitch July 19, 2015 // 37

Chomsky is a philosopher, not a statistician or an economist. He looks behind the facade of data to ask "why are we doing this?" "What are the consequences?" "What is the value of collecting the data?" "Why?"

Statisticians and economists (fortunately, not all of them) tend to think that when they have collected enough data, they will reach conclusions about the data. They think the data is as solid as "how many cars of this model sold? what was the profit margin? how should we price next year's model to maximize profit?" or "how high will corn grow with this amount of fertilizer? how many acres should be planted with this seed?"

The starry-eyed data-mongers believe that children can be measured like any agricultural or mechanical product.

But teachers know that children are not corn; they are not electrical appliances; they are not engineered; they are all different.

We need to listen to philosophers. We need to think about what we are doing to children and to teachers by treating them as products of a process that can be tightly controlled.

Chomsky says:

In recent years there's a strong tendency to require assessment of children and teachers, so that you have to teach to the tests, and the test determines what happens to the child and what happens to the teacher. That's guaranteed to destroy any meaningful educational process.

It means a teacher cannot be creative, imaginative, pay attention to individual students' needs. The students can't pursue things that – maybe some kid is interested in something, but you can't do it because you need to memorize something for this test tomorrow. The teacher's future depends on it as well as the student's.

The people sitting in offices, the bureaucrats designing this, they're not evil people, but they are working within a system of ideology and doctrines, which turns what they are doing into something extremely harmful.

By treating children and teachers as widgets, we destroy the meaning of education. The rankings derived from data, Chomsky says, are meaningless because the tests are artificial social constructs.

Overview, Term 3 2015



Welcome back to Term 3 and a time that is sure to be quite an adventure!

We hope you had a fun mid-year break and that you're all ready for the journey ahead! This week we welcome Amelie, Amos, Piper and Sylvie into our group alongside their families- be sure to say hi and introduce yourselves if you haven't already.

Term 3 is going to have an African flavour to tie in with our 'Musica' Viva visit. During week 5 we will have musicians perform traditional music from Senegal. Prior to their visit, Group 1 will learn then teach the rest of the school a song called 'Wa deukeubile'. The song is sung in the Wolof language and retells a story of a town that was overrun by mice so they used this song alongside body percussion to scare them away.

During a class meeting about the use of our space at the end of Term 2, the children asked if the back deck (not the wood one) could be made into a music deck (someone wanted to "rock out" at lunchtimes!). We thought these two ideas could be linked in some way...we'll see what direction the children take with that. Are there any drummers out there that would like to be involved in any way? Any musical ideas/expertise welcomed, please let us know!

To lead into this theme, we will read and explore 'Jungle Drums' by Graeme Base. This beautifully illustrated book is not only set in Africa and contains an array of wildlife but also explores concepts of the similarities and differences among us and acceptance of those things that make each and every one of us unique. A beautiful book perfect for reconnecting the children, warts and all!

This theme is so broad and could go in many directions. We will follow the children's lead but expect that it will be a theme with many geography, history, art and music links. We hope to explore an environmental/sustainability issue but will wait to see what the children 'bring to the table'.

Literacy:

Andy and Grace will continue having some time in the week with groups of children. During this time, skills such as letter formation, phonemic awareness, reading, spelling, grammar and more are explored. These sessions are planned for their groups according to the needs of those children and where they are in their journeys.

We will also share whole group literacy sessions in which the children can apply these skills. This term, we will learn an oral retelling of 'Handa's Surprise' using the Talk4Writing model. The children will learn the story using a story map and retell it using actions. It is a style of delivery that offers something for every type of learner: visual (the story map pictures), kinaesthetic (the actions) and auditory (the sound of the story). Further, it introduces the other learning styles so that all can learn new ways to collect understandings. Once the structure of the narrative is embedded, the children 'imitate' the plot by adjusting features. Without even realising it, they will create their own story!

This will be recorded by creating a story map of their own.



Maths:

Again Andy and Grace will have grouped sessions in which many areas of maths will be explored. These include number, shape and measurement. These sessions will include a Mental Oral Starter and then consist of a mixture of guided activities and self-directed inquiry.

Likewise, we will have whole group maths times. These will be open ended activities in which the children can apply their maths skills in a hands on way. Ideas for this term include designing a safari park (to meet certain criteria) and building a safari truck to carry a given number of passengers. (This kind of activity covers a range of outcomes- often referred to as a STEAM activity: Science, Technology, Engineering, Art and Maths).

In other news...

In the before mentioned class meeting, we had a discussion about the 'dress up' loft and the children felt the space wasn't used as well as it could be. After talking through ideas (an exercise loft was ruled out- by the children- because of the slanted roof) they decided that they wanted it to be a 'calm', 'chilled' space where they could go to do things such as drawing, making pompoms and finger knitting, perhaps even a touch of meditation. Therefore, this term will see the loft developing into a craft type space. We are already collecting resources to be used up there. If you are a crafty type, please, we'd love some help (and Grace is desperate to learn how to use a sewing machine...and crochet...and knit-could you teach her alongside children, how fab would it be for them to see Grace on a learning journey that many of them are far ahead on themselves?)

Also, we were looking back at our time together at the end of last term and many of the children fondly recalled 'Rainbow Fish' and 'Scaredy Squirrel' from last year. For newer parents, we shared the books and then the children each had the puppet for a night at home, drew up their adventures and then recounted their tales to the class the next day. Watch out for a new puppet arriving in class sometime soon! When the puppet arrives in your home, please feel no pressure 'to perform'. The point of the exercise is for the children to have fun and use their imagination. Engage with them creating scenarios and they can draw/write it up.

Phew! Sounds like quite a term! As well as our theme, the children will have 'Open Space' time to do with as they wishcreate performances, paint, construct, wander, sit, play.

Join us for Book boxes Mondays, Wednesday and Fridays if you can!

Just before we sign off, we have a favour to ask; could we please encourage everyone to attempt prompter arrivals to school? We know it may be misleading that we don't gather the children to the carpet until ten past 9 and that we let the children mill until then. However, these ten minutes allow us time to connect with each other, offer a relaxing start and sets up a positive mood for the day. We find that we are gathering together later and later because of the low number of children that are present and settled by that time. Having to postpone our start ever day eats into time elsewhere and means that children are missing out on the overview of the day and the start of story time. We also notice that the children find it harder to come in and join us when they have missed out on this time. Important social connections among children for the day are also made at that time.

We know that traffic can throw a spanner in the works and that some mornings just go wonky but it really is in the best interest of the children to get them here for 9am and let them have that reconnection time.

Africa is our theme for the term and this has been inspired by a visit by Musica Viva with a performance by 'Teranga'. There will be singing and dancing from Senegal and they will be performing at Kinma on Thursday 20th August. We will spend the first few weeks of the term exploring African sounds and movements, body percussion, rapping and learning some of the songs and actions so we can join in with the performance.

Our 'African Adventures' theme will incorporate drumming, mask making, the art of story telling, creative writing, cooking and digital story books. Our maths will be contextual where possible exploring maps, big numbers (populations), distances etc. We've brainstormed with the children on their ideas, interests and questions on Africa and we will endeavour to follow these lines of interest over the course of the term.

We will be holding parent / teacher meetings this term. Please come and see us to make a time that's convenient.

Basketball continues on Friday morning. Your child will either take part at the 8.30 - 9.00 or the 9.00 - 9.30 slot. They know which group they are in. Please make sure that they arrive on time for their session with Jerome. His time with us is limited and precious and if they are late then they will miss out! French with Morag continues and this term we are going to have yoga with Mikaela also on a Friday. This will start in week 3.
