Preschool

We hope that you have all been keeping warm with winter wonders like we have been at preschool. Here are a couple of examples of the ways that we are spending our winter days.

Firstly, Kay is overseas until next term to be with her family. We have familiar faces covering her absence. Please see Christine or Felicity for any issues or concerns.

ALSO LAST DAY OF TERM 2 IS FRIDAY 6 JULY, WE <u>Return on Wednesday 1 August</u>.

On Monday 18 June Sadiqa, Aliya's mum, came in to help celebrate Eid with the preschool. She brought in wholemeal flour to make flat breads with the children. Karthi, Satiqa and the children helped to measure and mix and knead the flour and water and make a dough. They rolled it into balls then made it flat to cook on the frypan. We also made gluten free flat breads. The children enjoyed these warm with maple syrup.



Eid is the celebration of the end of Ramadan. It's breaking the fast of Ramadan where Muslim people have been fasting for 30 days between sunrise and sunset. In Muslim countries, it is common for the capitals to decorate their cities with lights and commemorate the end of the holy month. Children are dressed in new clothes and offered gifts and money to celebrate the occasion. Ramadan is one of the five pillars of Islam - known as Sawm.

Before they ate their flat bread we talked about what the celebration of Eid is and that some of our friends celebrate this festival just like others have other celebrations in their families. Nina had brought dates which are often used as the first food to break the fast, called a roza, which the children enjoyed eating as well.

We feel it is important to incorporate many different family traditions and celebrations in our program to demonstrate acceptance of similarities and diversity.





NEEDLE SEWING

Today we did some sewing with bodkin needles. Many were very keen to be involved, we made a waitlist with the names of children who waited for their turns, sometimes this was a challenge when they wanted to be sewing now!!!



The children chose their thread colour and some threaded the bodkin needle by themselves. Felicity showed them how to put the needle under and over and then pull through the thread. Some used big stitches that were going from the front to the back and others used small stitches around the edges like a blanket stitch.

Others would like to have a go another day, like Abby and Lola, Keira wants to bring in her heart pillow to mend. Casper and Grace recalled doing a similar activity at tinkering where they sewed around a heart shape. We will try this another time, to draw a shape and sew on the shape.

The children are using their dexterity and fine motor skills for this activity. They "manipulated the equipment and managed tools with increasing competence and skill." (EYLF pg 21) They "recognised their individual achievement" (EYLF pg 31).
