
All our produce is certified organic and locally sourced. Most our leafy greens are paddock to plate in 24hours grown for us down south in Camden and Picton.

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Transition Meeting Notes - Tuesday 6th November 2018

Differences between Preschool and Primary:

- No fences
- Groupings separate but there are times when they do things together

Year K (Class '0') will be in the new classroom

School starts 9.00am, students can arrive at 8.30am as long as teacher knows they are here Pick up is at 3.00pm – please let teachers know when leaving

If students are away parents are to advise school with the reason by 10.30am, either by

- phone to office 9450 0738, or
- email: office@kinma.nsw.edu.au, or
- text to office mobile: 0474 500 707

If students are to going away on extended holidays, this notice must be put in writing and approved by Julie Carr first.

Parent chats with teachers: these can be with a teacher before 9.00am or after 3.00pm (there are formal parent teacher interviews in Term 1 and Term 3).

Call the office if very important that you speak with a teacher outside of those times

Students are always to wear or have in their bag shoes/thongs Closed shoes will be needed for excursions, long bush walks etc.

All clothes to be labelled with child's name – a large amount of lost property is collected by Jan Mayo during the term, which if uncollected by end of term is washed and taken to charity. We ask all parents to pick up any lost property they see and put it in the Lost Property storage area.

'No hat, no play' - all students are to bring a wide-brimmed hat to school

Communication: this is done these ways -

- Newsletter weekly, with fortnightly updates by groups to let you know what's happening in your child's classroom
- Facebook for reminders and generic items, mainly used by parents for other parents
- Email for direct communication from the office or Kinma Staff

Structured eating times – morning tea 10.30am, lunch 12.30pm (Groups 2&3 12.45pm) Students will sit and eat for 10 minutes before they can go and play During transition times and in the early part of the term they can nibble something if they're tired or hungry

Staffing for 2019 – being decided and will be advised to parents once staff have been informed

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Timetabling – structure of the day is :

Morning/Middle session/End of day session There will be Maths, Literacy, dress-up times, drama, music and more Swimming in Term 1 and Term 4, Basketball in Term 3 and term 4

There will always be a Kinma teacher with the students at swimming.

There will be a Preschool staff member in the class morning and middle sessions in Term 1, and longer if required.

Children taking Wednesday off is an option, though this is not compulsory Fees are still the same if you take this option.

We ask that you tell the teacher if you are going to be doing this If undecided on a Wednesday you need to tell us by 10.30am if your child is not coming in.

Admin is always open to hear any concerns or ideas you have.

Why are we having a 4th Group?

- Our numbers are increasing
- 2017 72, 2018 84, 2019 95
- There will be 15 children in the new class

Kinma is a 9 year journey, Preschool to Group 3.

It's very important to introduce children to our framework early.

A few years ago we had 37% of children coming down, now we have over 83% (13/18) coming (we had no places for 2 other families), others are leaving to go elsewhere.

At the end of 2019 they will merge into Group 1, some 1's will move into Group 2. The cycle will start again with another 15 or so coming into Primary and by end of 2020 we will have 18 students going onto high school.

There will be 30 students in Group 1 at the start of 2019, fewer mid-year when some students transition.

Preschool

We have been continuing with our sustainability efforts as we labelled the bins for all the sorting that we do. We discussed as a group what all the bins are for. We investigated where we put different food scraps and different plastics. We identified that the red lidded bin is for land fill and we hope that this bin is the emptiest to help our earth. The bins that we use are the red lid for landfill; yellow lid for hard plastics, tins, container, blue lid for paper and cardboard; green lid for compost; a chicken bin for food



scraps for the chickens (not orange peel or banana peel – they don't like these) and a soft plastic bin for wrappers that is taken to the shops. We talked about what sort of things these rubbish items are turned into like recycled paper, glass bottles, clothing, playground equipment and soil.

Other efforts that we have been making to help our earth is to use alternatives to glitter. Lizzie made coloured salt with the children that can be used for added texture and sparkle and colour just as glitter is used. We asked for ideas of what to call these sprinkles and the most popular was 'Schmitter' suggested by J. Other ideas were 'Unbad glitter' by E, 'Holly' by N and 'Salt Glitter' by C. We may end up using a few names and see which ones stick – so to speak!



An area of focus that we will have across the term is Story. We want to include many different facets of stories from books, recited stories, audio books, yarning stories, factual stories, child initiated stories and many others. In this picture the children are listening to stories on the listening post. Many parents may recall this sort of equipment from their own school days!

If you are reading a story with your child, maybe other children would like to join you. Or maybe you have a story to share with us, please speak to one of the staff with any ideas.



Lily, M&I's mum, joined us earlier in the week for a bushwalk, thank you Lily. It was one of the hot days and yet the bush protected us and treated us well as we meandered along the path in the shade of the trees. We headed to boat rock and met a horse named Yogi Bear along the way. At boat rock with had some refreshments and recalled a story that we had heard from a horse rider on our last bushwalk about a frog that sat on top of the hill and let all the water out of its mouth down the hill and a boat floated along this water. When the water dried up the boat and the frog turned to stone! We feel that by having stories about our land we can connect with the land more deeply.

On our way back, some of the children wanted to run, I said run to jump rock. Well they ran past jump rock and ended up at one that looks a lot like jump rock just a bit further along the path. We realized we don't have a name for this rock and we started coming up with ideas for it like twin jump rock and turtle rock. We will discuss this further with the other preschool children, or maybe you have an idea for a name for one of the land marking rocks?

As it was a hot day we stopped for a while to refresh ourselves in the cooling waters of the



creek. We climbed the log that lies across the creek in the most perfect way. We are so fortunate to have such a beautiful place to visit so readily. We would love to get to the creek more often so if you have a morning that you could join us please add your name to the parent volunteer sheet on the sign in desk or see a staff member. Thank you.



Group 1 Overview

'Auslannica'

Having merely dusted the surface of the Kinmini experience from last term, Group 1 will redesign and continue with our mini lands. Under the banner 'Auslannica' we will continue to look at the relationship between the people of Kinmini and those of Aquaplenty.

The children will have opportunity to step into the shoes of each community and look at ways in which their cultures align and the differences between them. This will first involve the monumental task of establishing culture, what it means and how it is represented. One of our many goals is to establish very different cultures and ways of living to workshop ways of reaching common ground and compromise. We hope that as this experience builds, so too will the lands within Auslannica.



So what has that looked like so far??

We kicked off the theme (or rather, continued from last term!) with the book 'Weslandia', about one boy's imagination in creating a civilisation of his own! As to be expected, upon finishing the book everyone had a plethora of ideas to share on how we could create our Aquaplenty civilisation.

There was lots of collaboration; the exchanging and fusing of ideas filled Oceanum as they planned and drew out their big plans for the new Auslaniccan community!



Considering our sub-tropical ecosystem, everyone's houses utilised the trees and natural rock formations. N and L used bamboo to create their teepees and M & O utilised a naturally formed cave behind a waterfall. D & T considered the wet climate, predicting that flooding might be a problem. They factored this in by having different housing plans; a log cabin, a cave behind the waterfall and an underground house.


We then made real-life connections, through a brief video about an Amazonian tribe. It provided great insight into the housing and resources they used. This opened the discussion to talk about how groups had thought about how they would gather food and water to live in Aquaplenty.

Here are some of their sharings;

- J & A built a wooden platform for the water to fall down. The water comes down into the window and we use the water for drinking, washing and cooking. For food they made a vertical garden on a tree. It's a magic tree - everytime you pick a piece of fruit, a different type of fruit grows back.
- *S* & *L* collected rain water, flowing down a pipe at the top of their treehouse and into the tank.
 - *M & Z water source was from the bottom of the waterfall in a pond. There was a suction cup which transferred water from the*
 - N & L used knives and traps to hunt for and get food from animals.
- C& H used a line which was attached to a furnace so when they caught fish they could cook it straight away
- E considered older cultures for ideas in how to hunt for and cook their food. Using wood and animal bones, he shared that people could make fire sticks, bows and arrows, spears.



Housing, food and water weren't the only things considered! Some groups even considered how they would create electricity! Cedric utilised the waterfall, placing a turbine in the water which generated electricity. L and G created their electricity by using the energy created from burning wood and animal bones. To top it all off, written language was created! D created an alphabet, consisting of 120 symbols! J and W designed their alphabet, using symbols to represent certain sounds (digraphs).



These experiences lend themselves to many aspects of the children's social and emotional development. As they step into the shoes of each community, they are able sympathise with others, seeing objectively the different opinions that stem from each culture. Through roleplay children are able to relate to their own worlds and translate the skills learnt of acceptance and compromise. Plus, it's a lot of fun!

Literacy, numeracy and beyond!

"Children learn through everything they see, hear, smell, touch and taste in the environment and experiences provided. Their learning 'is not compartmentalised' and they learn through making 'connections between experiences and ideas.. related to any aspect of their life' "

The opportunities Auslannica offers in literacy are literally endless. We have already started with persuasive writing using our newspapers as the catalyst. We have brainstormed the feelings of each community and roleplayed ways in which we can express opinions without contempt. Over the coming weeks we will document songs, recipe's, history, shared beliefs and values: anything that will make up our culture. We hope to eventually share resources between communities, so we might even have trade agreements!!

In maths we will look into volume and capacity (as we figure out what to do with all the water) as well as many scenarios involving our mini lands. As an example, the older groups have started weather-based scenario's to practice some of our core skills. This involved making a (mock) web site modelled off The Bureau of Meteorology. The children add up total rainfalls, plot them on a chart, map out the area, find averages, double, triple, multiply and subtract. We incorporate some of our work on fractions from last term through questions such as 'if $\frac{1}{4}$ of the total rainfall for May was 60mm, what is $\frac{3}{4}$ of the total rainfall?'

In Kate and Grace's maths group, Aquaplenty will serve 'plenty' of opportunities to explore mathematical concepts in a contextual way! We are currently working on positioning, through mapping out the school and the open dialogue surrounding the each landmark's location in relation to others. For example, the hall is <u>behind</u> the office and library. This will flow nicely into mapping Aquaplenty, Kinmini and perhaps even new places to be discovered in Auslannica! Mapping will also provide a great opportunity to consolidate and deepen our knowledge of 2-D and 3-D shapes!

Uno's garden has provided a rich opportunity to explore addition and multiplication across both math's groups. From replanting the desolate and dry Aquaplenty as a whole class, to consolidating these skills in 'double dice bingo', number is ever present! Group 1ers love the opportunity to problem solve and apply their critical thinking and number skills in our maths sessions!



French continues this term on Fridays

Toby: Lots of friendships happened.










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In mathematics, the children have been continuing to investigate patterns: number sequences, geometric patterns, finding algebraic rules and creating their own.



We have also been looking at the properties of 3 dimensional shapes and investigating the numerical relationships between these features. This was part of our preparation for our designs on our sanctuaries. We have had much discussion about equitable treatment of animals and children are in the process of designing sanctuaries for their chosen animals. They need to consider the plants and habitat to enrich their animals' lives and investigate how they can realistically replicate this in their sanctuarium (diorama). As part of this they also need to consider: size of enclosure, socialisation (same animal or different, number and sex of animals), foliage / plants, shelter, privacy and water requirements.

With the combination of our theme and our mathematical exploration of probability and chance, the Melbourne Cup opened up a wealth of investigations, resulting in interesting discussion and valuable learning.


