Yurt Farm 2020

Dear Families,

I know that you will find this email almost impossible to digest... BUT we need to start gearing up for T1 2020 and the yurt farm experience. As you know (or most of you) it is now law that no adult can attend an overnight camp with a school unless they have a Working with Children Check. This check does not cost, just takes a little bit of time to complete the forms on line and then present to Services NSW for identification and verification. (Office of the Children's Guardian)

If you completed one for this year's camp and it is still in date then all good, as we have these on file. If you did not attend or are new to the School from April 2018 you will need to action and create a WWCC. The School requires your WWCC number and your date of birth to be emailed to office@kinma.nsw.edu.au prior to the 20th January 2020.

Please do Claire and I (and most importantly yourselves) the greatest favour by setting a notification in your phone to remind you to get onto this early in the New Year. I am sure you can understand the amount of work we need to get done (as we have to check all numbers) to make the camp a great experience for all. I am unaware of any school that allows families to attend.

If you do not have a check YOU CANNOT attend the camp.

Music 2020

Just letting everyone know that the wonderful Holly will not working with us in music next year as she is going into the corporate world. We wish her well, and thank her for the energy and commitment that she has made to our children over the years. Holly has introduced us to another teacher (Dean) who will be filling the shoes from next year.

Emergency Procedures

TRANSITION TO PRIMARY

Transition to Primary school is an important milestone in every child's life. This transition impacts the child's confidence, their emotional regulation including separation, socialisation skills and the ability to make friends and their skills in concentration and attention span. The expansion of their world to include a whole new community with new significant adults and older children is also important. It also affects the family routine with the new expectation of being at school ready for a 9am start for 4-5 days a week with everything packed, remembered and organised. For all of these reasons Preschool teachers and Primary staff put time and thought into each child's and family's transition.



On our first Transition visit we became familiar with the room by using paints, clay, Duplo, dress ups and more. Some of the popular activities were using the pizza shop and the ice cream stand that Group 4 had made for their theme on airports. We met new friends that will also be in Group 4 next year, Lachlan and Bodhi.

On the second visit we went to Group 4 for French with Morag and then had time in the classroom where we started using our journals. We found out that journal time will happen regularly and it is a time of quiet drawing and writing and a book may be read at that time too.

After Mila's transition visit to her new primary school, she showed us her "Big School" T shirt. She also showed us inside her "Big School" bag. Ivy was very interested. There was a calendar – we talked about which date would be her first day at school. There also was a height chart from her transition visit which the other children used with her to compare heights, Mila, Ivy, Max and Elijah checked their height with Kate's (Mila's mum) help. Pablo also visited his new school on several occasions and told us about the trains, toys, stories and his tracing book. "Big kids served the fruit to the little kids." he explained to us. And that he had a buddy.

Our next visit to Kinma Primary, we met another friend named Adelyn who will also be in Group 4 next year. Andy read us a story, and we learned new songs like 'Grandma's feather bed' and 'What a Beautiful World'. We played on the equipment in the bottom playground for a while. Then, we walked around to see the invisible fence which helps us to know where we can go to play at morning tea and lunchtime.



Reading a story, concentrating, listening, answering questions, familiarisation are some of the aspects of our new environment.

Here, we are looking at the invisible fence that keeps us out of the car park. There was a balance between the activities on the carpet where we were listening and concentrating and those using our bodies to move around the outside area to see our invisible fences and to discuss the boundaries of the primary school.

We observed the paper experiment. There were 3 pieces of paper folded into different shapes. We talked with the person next to us to predict which shape would support the most books and which one would collapse first. We had fun watching the demonstration.



PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT

Christine, Karthi, Nina and Felicity attended an evening at Macquarie University entitled *Pedagogical Love and Care.* A panel of academics and teachers from the early childhood and primary sectors as well as representatives from Department of Education led the discussion about the conceptualised term 'Professional Love'. This was introduced by Jools Page in her research on complex notion of attachment, intimacy, care and love in the earliest years of life.

Fay Hadley highlighted that the Early Years Learning Framework (EYLF), the curriculum for the early years which we implement at Kinma Preschool, was written 10 years ago and the word 'love' is not used even once. The words attachment, caring, relationship, affection and respect all are present throughout the document, and the question was raised, if the EYLF was written now, would it have the word love in it? Can we professionally love the children that we work with? Mel Ferris, the Educational Leader from Mia Mia, the demonstration Early Learning Centre at Macquarie University, passionately led the team in critical reflection about the wording of their philosophy in which the word love is now included.

Interestingly, the Primary specialist from the Department of Education thought that generally, the professional love that is built into the Early Years sector can start to diminish in the primary years, and by the secondary stage, there is even less. He thought this was due to the Code of Conduct for primary and high school.

Linda Harrison, an academic, shared her research about Student and Teacher Relationships with children aged 4 to 11 years old. The scale showed closeness between teacher and student and the amount of conflict in classrooms. The more closeness present the less conflict there was. Relationships are paramount in education, is Pedagogical or Professional Love needed?

Rita Pierson in her book "Every child needs a champion" (2013) states "a child won't learn from a teacher they don't like".
